

Yucky wolf spiders actually help

It's not your imagination -- there really are more big, fuzzy brown spiders in your house in the fall.

But don't let them scare you. They are harmless.

They're called wolf spiders, and every autumn they seek warmth while they search for mates. While you might not like the uninvited guests, these spiders are actually doing some good.

Despite its daunting appearance, the wolf spider is mostly harmless to humans, according to Healthline. These shy, non-aggressive arachnids are more likely to run and hide than fight. Since their venom is not toxic to humans, a rare wolf spider bite is mildly itchy at worst.

Wolf spiders do not spin webs and instead hide during the day and emerge at night to feast on other household pests -- any bug will do.

Most wolf spiders sneak in through tiny cracks around windows and doors, so check for openings and caulk these entrances as needed. Spray spiderfriendly areas, like potential points of entry and hiding spots, with a mixture of water and peppermint or citrus oil to repel them. Wolf spiders will also hang out wherever they can find bugs, such as porches where lights attract other tiny critters. Turn the light off at night and seal and spray the area to encourage wolf spiders to choose another hunting ground.

If you find a wolf spider in your home and don't want to become roommates, try not to kill it, if possible. Simply trap it under a glass, slide a piece of stiff paper underneath and escort it back outside -- no touching involved. Even if you didn't invite it inside, you're both on the same team in a never-ending battle against less desirable household pests.

Then they sailed for the New World, where they had to literally build themselves a place to live. Half of them died the first year.

For the Pilgrims, there was plenty of hardship and death in the past, with plenty more to come that they didn't yet know about. But they did manage to set aside a day in gratitude for their hard-won harvest.

That is the thing about gratitude -- it is always about the present. You can't know what will happen tomorrow. But right now, if you have to clean up your house, be grateful for the house. If you have to make dinner, be grateful for the food.

Finding the best holiday deals

Looking to save money on Christmas spending this year? If so, you may have to put in a bit more effort compared to seasons past. Still, hard work may result in substantial savings.

Financial consultants at Deloitte project that holiday sales will increase by 7 to 9 percent this season, with ecommerce sales expected to grow by 11 to 15 percent. Rising wages may mean that many families have more to spend compared to years past, but inflation and supply constraints could mean higher than normal prices.

Electronics may be hard to come by. However, through electronic outlet stores, you can pick up lightly used electronics at a great price, often under warranty. Apple, for example, sells certified refurbished Mac laptops for \$150 or more off. You can score substantial discounts on Apple Watches, iPhones and other devices as well.

Tips for a perfect pie crust

Pie crust -- it's simple in theory, but even seasoned cooks sometimes shy away from this Thanksgiving essential and rely instead on frozen pie shells or pre-rolled boxed crusts.

There's nothing wrong with saving time and energy with a ready-made crust, but a buttery crust from scratch is easier and faster than you might think.

* First, choose the right recipe. Most pie crust recipes are similar, but a classic butter crust should contain only flour, butter, a little salt, some sugar and water or a water mixture

to bind it all together. A single crust recipe will make enough dough for one pie shell, while a double crust will make two pie shells or a shell with a top. Pie crust keeps in the refrigerator for three or four days and freezes well.

* Don't skimp on good ingredients. High-quality unsalted butter, such as European-style, is easier to work with and provides great flavor. For flour, fresh all-purpose flour works well. Gold Medal flour is beloved by pie makers for its wide availability and ideal protein content. You can also try a lower-protein pastry flour. Avoid bread flours, which are higher in protein and will make tougher crusts.

* Make sure all your ingredients are very cold. Cube and chill butter. Refrigerate the water or drop in a couple of ice cubes. You can even freeze your flour first.

* If you're blending the butter into the flour by hand, run your hands under cold water first to cool them down. Make sure that any tools, such as pastry cutters or knives, aren't warm from the dishwasher or storage near a hot stove. A chilled ceramic work bowl is also helpful. If you're using a food processor or a stand mixer to blend your fat and flour, make sure the pieces are cool.

* Butter should be broken down until your mixture resembles roughly-ground cornmeal, but a few slightly larger chunks help create flaky layers and bursts of butter flavor.

* After you add the liquid, be careful not to overwork your mixture. Too much handling or stirring develops gluten, which leads to a tough pie crust. Try using a silicone spatula to gently fold and press the mixture until it just barely holds together.

* Always chill your dough in the refrigerator after assembly -- at least two hours, but overnight is best. This gives gluten time to relax and allows your liquid to fully hydrate your flour, forming a solid dough that you can roll out.



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6 things you should never plug into a power strip

Powerful appliances should never be plugged into a power strip and you might be surprised which appliances count.

1. Space heater.

Portable heaters cycle on and off, with each on-cycle drawing a surge of current. If plugged into a power strip, this surge usually causes an overload, which can cause a fire.

2. Microwave.

Requires a dedicated wall outlet.

3. Slow cooker.

These common appliances may not draw surges of power, but they use power continuously over long periods. Plug them into wall outlets instead.

4. Toaster and toaster oven.

Those red-hot coils inside don't heat up without a lot of current, which can quickly overload a power strip.

5. Hairdryer, curling iron.

These draw significant amperage to get hot -- too much for a power strip.

6. Coffee maker.

All it does is heat up water. But it does it with a lot of amps. It is misleadingly simple. Always plug into the wall.

Home remodeling costs rise ... and fall

Lots of people are doing home improvement projects this year, but there are stumbling blocks.

Prices are higher, some materials may be limited and contractors don't have enough help, but these difficulties should ease in the coming months.

A survey by Harvard University's Joint Center for Housing Studies found that 80 percent of respondents had started DIY home improvement projects as of May 2021.

Meanwhile, costs for home improvement and construction materials have risen. The petrol-chemical supply chain was disrupted by a deep freeze in the South last winter, just one factor that caused painting and coating prices to rise 10.6 percent from 2020.

Lumber prices are up but cooling off. In May, lumber per thousand board feet surged to over \$1,600, up from \$500 in October last year. Prices have since fallen to roughly \$600 as of Sept. 23.

An Autodesk-AGC of America Workforce Survey found that 90 percent of contractors surveyed had openings for hourly craft positions.
